# 1.2. Reviewer 2

Reviewer:

In the section titled "Conditions for the Termination of Arbitration," the flow between mutual consent and other causes is abrupt. Use transition sentences to connect these ideas better.

The comparative perspective mentioned in the introduction should be explicitly revisited in later sections. In particular, the discussion on Iranian and international arbitration (e.g., the paragraph beginning with "This research aspires to detail these frameworks...") would benefit from greater integration of comparative findings.

The paragraph beginning "Judicial oversight is exercised at two critical stages..." would benefit from examples of specific Iranian cases or judgments to ground the discussion in practical reality.

In "Conditions for the Termination of Arbitration," clarify terms like "finality and repetition" with examples or scenarios to improve reader comprehension.

The discussion of public policy in the section "Judicial Oversight in the Enforcement and Annulment of Arbitral Awards in Iranian Law" (starting with "Legal systems also recognize 'public policy'...") could explore what constitutes public policy under Iranian law for more specificity.
